In the Marine Officer training set up, students in all class ranks can participate. The corps has two definite programs in which students may enroll. The first plan is open to college freshmen, sophomores and juniors. This is the Platoon Leaders class.

Cadets attend two six-week summer training periods held in Quantico, Va. Upon successful completion of these two summer courses students obtain the Second Lieutenant's commission.

The second plan is open to seniors and graduate students. It is the Officers' Candidate course. Students attend ten weeks training for a commission followed by five months of specialized schooling as a commissioned officer.
